## **OLD** Information that may be **NEW** to you

Ohio born Ransom Eli Olds expanded his 1892 gasoline powered engine to build a "horseless carriage" in 1897 at his Olds Motor Vehicle Company plant in Lansing Michigan. The company was later renamed the Olds Motor Works.

The "Curved Dash Oldsmobile" was the best-selling vehicle in the world from 1900 to 1904. A vehicle called the *Speedwagon* was also produced in Lansing. Wonder where that Rock group *REO Speedwagon* came up with their name?

A little known tidbit is the fact that RE Olds used an assembly line production method – albeit a stationary type – before that Henry Ford guy, who seems to get historical credit for it possibly because Ford's was a moving one. Mr. Olds sold his interest in the Oldsmobile company to an upstart endeavor named *General Motors* in 1904.

Intrigued by the proximity of available land near Tampa and Tarpon Springs, Florida, Mr. Olds purchased 37,541 acres of land in the upper Pinellas area in 1916. Currently our town of Oldsmar is made up of 6,080 acres, so you can see that our Founder had <u>big</u> plans for the area. Originally our town was called R.E. Olds-on-the Bay from its founding in 1916 until 1927, when the residents, wishing to capitalize on the popularity of Tampa, called it Tampa Shores. That name lasted until 1937 when our sparsely populated hamlet voted to change the name and incorporate it into the current Oldsmar.

"Olds" of course for Ransom Eli....and the "mar" being the Spanish for "sea, or a body of water". Even though your OLDsLetter Editor is from New Jersey, I can figure out the name composition, since our Oldsmar sits at the top of *Old Tampa Bay*.

Having lost most of his property assets (the Bank building an exception of course) to the last hurricane to make landfall in Pinellas County in 1921, Mr. Olds eventually liquidated all his Florida assets and was gone from the area by 1926.



### **UPCOMING EVENTS**

Hopefully sometime in 2024, the OHS museum will begin the process of moving to a larger room at the Oldsmar Library. After much consideration, the OHS Board of Directors approved the City's suggested relocation. Regretfully, the museum will not be in the historic bank building any longer, but on the positive side, the library location should expose the museum to more foot traffic and visibility.
